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Summary

2018 was a year of resilience. Despite a major transition in leadership, the organization collectively managed the situation and strengthened its capacity.

Since 2017, our reach increased from 383 girls to 776 girls through 45 programs (33 in-school and 12 out-of-school) in 18 communities across the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo. Key programs included Girls at Bat, Operation SMART, Staying Strong Mentoring, Friendly PEERSuasion, Project Bold and Media Literacy. Over 10 volunteers participated in these programs by sharing their time and experiences with the girls. We appreciate their continued support and intend to deepen our community engagement.

Above success would not have been possible because of tireless efforts of staff and board members. Prolonged understaffing had meant increased work-load on each staff, including 2 Program Facilitators and 1 Interim Executive Director. However, we ensured to continue quality program delivery and filled 2 vacancies towards the end of year (Administrative Assistant and Executive Director). The Board grew to 19 members – the biggest size that we had ever seen.

Our revenue grew from \$257,934 in 2017 to \$321,856 in 2018. With operational challenges, our fundraising efforts were slower than anticipated. Presented by Fort McMurray First Nations #468 and supported by local businesses, our Golf Tournament remained a key fundraiser event. Given the challenging economic climate, we are very appreciative of the community's continued support.

We strive to increase our reach, particularly in Indigenous communities, while deepening impact so that more girls will become strong, smart and bold.

The past few years, our community has struggled through the economic downturn, the wild fire and rebuilding the city. Despite all that, we continue to have amazing support from our sponsors to ensure that we fulfill our commitment to program delivery, continue to reach more girls and continue to expand our programs to the outlying communities of this region. We could not do this without the support of our funders, staff and volunteers. Thank you for the support!

As an organization we have learned that what we do is very important. It's about the power of example to nurture a new generation. It's about creating positive change and enabling opportunity. It's about learning from failure and being brave enough to break the mold. And it's about building foundations under the dreams of young girls, to create women of vision. This has been a true honor for me. Thank you.

Girls Inc. Run Club


The Girls Inc. Run Club was introduced to create a girls only environment where young girls can feel comfortable to be active, develop friendships, recognize their potentials & strengths, and gain confidence in their abilities to be physically active and with their bodies. Girls Inc. Run Club aims to give girls an environment where they can build their self-esteem, develop healthy body images (zero talk of weight loss or dieting) and have open discussions on such topics as running technique, how to deal with stress, and the benefits of eating healthy and physical activity.

15 girls met twice a week to practice, skills and motivate each other. During prep sessions, girls took part in weight training, building on speed and agility all while incorporating games to build stamina. The program builds skills and confidence to partake in the 5 KM race during the MacDonald Island Park Marathon. This program was designed by Girls Inc. of Northern Alberta Program Coordinator, Katlin Okonkwo and supported by Girls in Motion.

Girls At Bat (Jays Care Foundation)

Girls Inc. of Northern Alberta and Jays Care Foundation worked together to specially design a program to make both playing and coaching baseball feel fun and safe that girls and young women who would normally sit on the side-lines or not even go near the field, have the courage to try. Once on the field, the program weaves fun and challenging baseball drills and skills with vital self-esteem, team-building and personal health activities to ensure that all participants gain far more than baseball skills.





This resulted in a well-rounded and comprehensive learning experience, yielding positive and powerful impact on the lives of young girls. 2018 was the 7th year for the Women of Inspiration Program. In each month for 12 months (June through May), a woman was selected by community nomination with a goal to recognize women throughout the Wood Buffalo region. These women were selected because they inspire others, break new ground or old barriers, help create change and embody the mission of Girls Inc. – to inspire all girls to be Strong, Smart & Bold. The series showed local girls positive role models who live within their community.

In 2018, we showcased the stories of 12 local women who were driving positive change for other women and girls, either directly or by example. All 12 successful nominees were acknowledged at our 7th community celebration event in June 2018 at the UNIFOR Union Hall. Many people, including the nominees' family members, came out to celebrate. This marked the last year of Syncrude Canada being the title sponsor for the Women of Inspiration Series and Celebration event. Mix 103.7FM and McMurray YMM were media sponsors for this event.

To bring the program full circle, there continued to be a scholarship portion where each of 3 young women had received a \$3,000 Scholarship to help them work towards their goals and dreams.
